

For decades Brush has held graduation at a remote site. In the past, it has been held at Cleveland Public Auditorium, Blossom Music Center, the Front Row Theater and most recently at the Palace Theater. This year the ceremony was held on campus. Originally planned for Korb Field, the ceremony was moved to the Welser Gymnasium due to inclement weather.

It was an eventful year, but the Class of 2021 persevered through remote and hybrid learning. In true Arc style, they finished the year with millions of dollars in scholarships and many honors. The class completed over 14,000 hours of community service. Eighteen graduates received honors diplomas and three received their associate degrees. Eleven chose to join the military. A class of distinction.



This graduating class was cheated out of so many familiar traditions that have been part of the history of Brush. This class has met their challenges and continued the proud Brush academic tradition.








Class of '76 Brush ARC's 5th Annual Golf Extravaganza

WHY: To commemorate that special person, family or class, anyone may purchase a paver. You don't ha to be a Brush alum.





By Deb DiLillo Betz '76 ~ As we move in to the third decade of the 21st Century, school districts throughout the Cleveland area are undergoing major renovation projects to update aging and outdated buildings.


North Olmsted High School, built in 1964 was demolished in 2018 to make way for a new building, modernized and ready for the future. In April of 2021, demolition began on the old Richmond Heights High School, originally built in 1921, as their students moved in to their new turn-of-the-century facility.


In the last edition of the Alumni Arc-Lite (Autumn 2020) we wrote about the work being done to renovate Brush High School and included some pictures of the project in process. Now, several months later, we can provide a glimpse of the finished product.

Brush High School, originally built in 1927, underwent multiple additions as the community expanded through the years, however the building was in major need of a facelift. Superintendent Dr. Linda N. Reid faced a dilemma while considering options as she kept hearing from alumni that we did not want to lose the beauty that is the front of our historic school, with the magnificent clock tower and beautiful stone monument. Adam Parris, the architect with TDA Architecture commented, "It's one thing to do a "renovation project" and just knock down part of the building, then rebuild it. It's a completely different task to reuse something that's existed for a hundred years." However, the district provided a clear vision and request to adapt our historic high school and renovate it for the demands of a modern educational environment. The result of the dramatic refresh is a "new, old building" that will serve our community and students for years to come.

Among the many changes was a reorganization of the athletic spaces, modernization of the student dining area, a transformed library/media center, a new and secure entrance and front hallway, and widened corridors. New wall graphics and furniture were integrated throughout the building. The result is a high school that maintains the integrity and magnificence of the school we all remember but provides everything we would want and need for our children, grandchildren and great grandchildren as they pursue their education in to the 21st Century.
